In 1838 and 1839, the U.S president Andrew Jackson- forced the 5 Native American "civilized tribes", Choctaw, Seminoles, Creek, Chickasaw and the Cherokee Nation, to give up all of its owned lands east of the Mississippi river, and to re-locate to an area in Oklahoma, where they still reside in present-day.

This event not only shows the true nature of America's foundation of societal attitudes toward minorities, but also illustrates the way we "rid our ourselves of them, and their problems they so call "cause". Not to mention how we as a Nation have stripped the culture and uniqueness of such a prosperous society, through forcing the natives of this land to mold to the norms of the estranged Anglo American way of life.
